

# Policies Fueling this Gap Analysis

- Develop services for the aging population that are not tied to an institutional setting
- Insert visitability standards into Uniform Building Code or local building codes
- Determine if a PACE (Program for Allinclusive Care for the Elderly) is needed in RRR

### Health and Wellness Opportunities

Physical health, mental health, health care, safety

### Opportunities for Productive Activities

Social engagement, civic engagement, employment and education, recreation, culture and arts

- Stakeholder survey
- Home-based service inventory
- Document studies
- Synthesis of national literature
- Caregiver surveys
- CASOA
- Web survey of key informants
- Focus groups/interviews of seniors

# **Caregiver Survey Topics**

- Time commitment and length of care
- Types of care provided
- Challenges to providing care
- Types of help received
- Services of interest
- Alternate care options for care recipient
- Socio-demographics of provider and care recipient





- Low-cost turnkey older adult household survey
- Primary purposes of the survey
  - Gauge community strengths and needs
  - Identify older adult needs
  - Measure older resident participation in local activities
- Normative database has opinions of 38,900 older residents (55 years +)
- 11 AAAs in state of Colorado implementing in now
- State of Colorado is planning to fund other 5 later this fall\*



# **CASOA** in RRR

- Mailed survey to:
  - 1,500 older adults in Alpine area (estimated response of 600)
  - 1,000 older adults in Associated Governments of Northwest Colorado AAA (response ~ 400)
  - 1,000 older adults in Upper Arkansas AAA (pending state funding)
- Final reports will include national and state benchmarks



# Older Adult Benchmark Database

- National database has opinions of 38,900 older residents (55 years +)
- 2010 Colorado Benchmarks estimated to include 12,000-15,000 older adults
- Compilation of CASOA communities, The National Citizen Survey™ communities, and custom needs assessment communities



# Needs and Strengths Assessed through CASOA

# Health and Wellness

### **Physical health**

Overall health status, nutrition, fitness, falls, days institutionalized

### Mental health

Overall mental health, depression, confusion or forgetfulness

### **Health Care**

Medications, affordable health insurance

### Safety

Violent crime, property crime, fraud or scam, environmental hazards

### **Independent Living**

ADLs, caregiver burden

# Community Design and Land Use

### Land use

Convenience of services and activities of daily need

### **Mobility**

Safe and affordable, ability to get around

### **Housing**

Suitable housing, affordable housing, home maintenance

### Information and Planning

### Information

Services for older adults, Social Security and Medicaid, planning, legal, financial

# Productive Activities

### **Civic Engagement**

Volunteerism, civic attentiveness, voting

### **Social Engagement**

Social activities, social support, proximity to friends and family, current supports, neighborliness

### **Employment & Education**

Work in retirement, skill building, income

### **Recreation, Arts & Culture**

Participation in leisure activities

**Caregiving contribution** 

**Economic contribution** 



# **2010 Survey Methods and Goals**

### **Assessment Objectives**

- Identify community strengths and weaknesses
- Articulate the greatest needs of older adults in communities
- Provide strategies on best practices to meet older adult needs

### **Assessment Methods**

- Multi-contact mailed survey
- Representative sample of xx older resident households
- Response rates range: 41%-58% surveys; 3-5% margin of error
- Data statistically weighted to reflect older adult population norms in community

### **Assessment Goals**

### **Immediate**

Provide useful information for:

- Planning
- Resource allotment, development and leverage
- Advocacy efforts
- Stakeholder engagement

### Long-term

- Empowered communities
- Vibrant older adult populations
- Sustainable services for older adult
- populations
